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## PO'Nderings: "Epiphanies Great and Small"

From our Minister  
Rev. Patrick T. O'Neill

According to the church calendar, the Christmas season ends officially on the Feast of the Epiphany, the first week in January. The Gospel accounts are a bit vague on the timing, but tradition holds that the Three Wise Men from the East were late arriving in Bethlehem. The ox and lamb and the shepherds had all celebrated a full two weeks before Caspar, Balthazar, and Melchior finally made it to the humble stable.

It is a grand story these three royal pilgrims present to the imagination. Travelling by night, these kingly Zoroastrians reach across the centuries, laden with strange gifts for an unknown child. The gold we still understand. The frankincense and myrrh require some modern footnotes.

The Gospels never tell us what became of the Magi. We don't know if this particular trip was their only such one, or (blasphemy to suggest) whether they were in the habit of doing this sort of thing. We don't know how many comets they followed over the years, how many birthplaces they visited, or (blasphemy to suggest) exactly how many infants they honoured in this fashion. It makes for interesting, if somewhat heretical, speculation.

Writers and poets have always loved the Epiphany story, with its imagery, pathos, and simple humanity. It matters little whether the story we have is accurate in every detail. The birth of prophets requires some imagination, some poetry, some pageantry. This world without its stargazers, without its pilgrims, without heavenly portents now and then, is a stark and barren place.

The occasional comet still streaks across winter skies, to be sure. But our capacity to be awestruck has diminished. Babes, more and more of them, continue to be born in rude huts - and we pray that at least some of them will grow to be prophets. But kings no longer attend their births, and gold and frankincense and myrrh seem small recompense in a cold and violent world.

I say, here's to epiphanies, great and small, whenever they occur. A blessing on all Wise Men and Women, East and West. Here's to the stargazers and pilgrims everywhere, who are still foolish enough and brave enough to follow their stars, bringing their uncommon gifts to us all. See you in Chapel....

## News from the Management Committee

Any member of the Chapel is welcome to attend the Management Committee meetings as an observer. If you would like to attend, as a courtesy please contact either John Lawrence or Tanya Morrison (co-Chairs) in advance. The next meeting will be on Thursday 13 January 2012 at 7.00 pm in the Chapel (in the Committee Room).

**Induction of Rev. Patrick O'Neill as settled Minister at the Chapel on Saturday 7 January, at 3.00pm:** Rev. O'Neill told the MC that the Search Committee had preparations for this event well in hand. Invitations had gone out to local ministers and to members and clergy from other churches in the area were invited.

**Minister's Report:** Rev. O'Neill reported that he plans to hold a retreat for the MC and the Elders in the New Year. A small gathering from these groups had already met for an informal discussion about, amongst other things, the nature of membership and future directions.

**Worship Group Report:** The Worship Group's system for the Sunday morning and evening services is working well under Rev. O'Neill's leadership. Kate Buchanan, the Group's leader, is stepping down in January. The MC thanked her warmly for her work with the WG since she took up the post in February 2009.

**Property Sale Group:** Paul ver Bruggen outlined the current state of negotiations. Progress has been made and exchange of contracts is expected unless further problems arise.

Kathee Myers has resigned from the MC. The Chair thanked her for hard work and commitment to the Chapel over many years. She has worked on the sale of the Willoughby Road site from the start, and set up and overseen the letting of the car park spaces. Income from the car park now boosts the Chapel's funds significantly.

**The Hall:** The re-roofing of the Hall has now been completed. The scaffolding is due to be removed and the approach to the Manse cleared by mid December.

**The Hall Fundraising:** Approaches are being made, seeking substantial donations for the planned work to refurbish the Hall.

**Administrator's Report:** I.T: Sharron Conduit's report noted that there had been a number of problems with the office computer and it may be necessary to find other technical computer support.

Seating capacity of the Chapel and the Hall: Sharron (absent from the meeting) would be asked to check the capacity of both the Hall and the Chapel and report to the MC.

**Treasurer's Report:** £11,500 has been collected, by Erich Wagner, from Gift Aid, underlining the need for members to help us use this tax break where possible. The Chair reported that the Chapel's financial situation looked quite satisfactory at present. In future the Chapel's accountant will report an annual monthly cash flow forecast on a monthly basis.

**Co-Chair's Report:** John Lawrence reported that five members of the MC, including himself, will not be seeking re-election at the AGM to be held on Sunday 26 February 2012. In preparation for the AGM a letter from the co-Chairs has been sent out to members to go over the role and responsibilities of the MC and to air some issues about participation in Chapel life and financial commitment. The January issue of "Open Mind" is featuring the AGM to encourage members to contribute their views and votes at this essential event in the life of the Chapel.

### Where I Stand: Kieran Seale



I started coming to Chapel by accident, but now I have been a member here for a number of years, I am amazed at how much I belong... and that I couldn't really go anywhere else.

I was brought up as a Roman Catholic – an experience that was enough to put me off all religion for several decades! It was only when a friend of mine expressed an interest in trying a different type of religion and I was able to introduce her to the Chapel (where an old school friend was a member) that I became involved myself.

I consider myself to be an atheist. I certainly don't believe in a "God" in the sense that most religions would define it – someone who created the world etc.

It's amazing that people can believe that any single set of religious beliefs are universally "true" and that other religions are "wrong". I find it difficult to get my head around how Christians, for example, think. To believe that millions of Buddhists, Hindus, Muslims or Jews are somehow "wrong" in their religious belief because they don't believe that Jesus Christ is their Saviour is, I think, laughable. Being able to explore and celebrate the variety of religious belief in the world through Chapel is something I would recommend to anyone. But to say that any one is right or wrong is as meaningful as arguing about who is the best artist or composer who ever lived.

If I want to be really provocative I like to think that Unitarians – tolerant, inclusive and open minded – are much more followers of Jesus Christ (and therefore entitled to call ourselves "Christian") than those that claim to be Christians and consider him to be a/the God.

I firmly believe that an open and inclusive way of thinking about religion is the future and that Unitarianism – and the Chapel – will grow and thrive.

### Rosslyn Hill Chapel's Cold Weather Shelter 2011

This is the fourth year that we have participated in the cold weather shelter project. Seven churches in Camden offer an evening meal, overnight stay and breakfast to around 15 guests with each church taking one night of the week. Rosslyn Hill's evening was Friday this year. Our guests were amazing – warm, funny and friendly, and I know that the volunteers enjoyed their time with them. We had fabulous food, much of it donated, and regular supplies of cupcakes which some of the guests found addictive (!) and begged for extras to take away in the morning. We had music, games, conversation and laughter. Sixty-six people volunteered and worked hard to make the guests' stay a pleasant one. Sadly, only 17 members of the congregation volunteered, which does call into question whether this is a Rosslyn Hill Chapel project that will continue. I do hope so, as this is a social action project that really changes people's lives and makes a difference to the community where we live. Leighton Cole

Dear Friends,

In preparation for the Annual General Meeting (AGM) on Sunday 26 February, we thought it might be interesting and helpful to set out some thoughts about the Chapel, looking at the role of the Management Committee (MC) and the importance to the future of the Chapel of volunteers and a strong financial base.

The AGM gives members the opportunity to gain an overview of what's been happening in the Chapel during the year. The co-Chairs of the MC report to members, the Treasurer presents the accounts and members can read about the work of the activity groups. Your comments and suggestions for the future and your votes all give the MC an idea of what you think should be the Chapel's priorities and policies. The AGM is of course the time to elect new members to the MC. There will be a number of vacancies, and you may like to think now if there's someone you feel would be a valuable member of the Committee, or you may consider standing

yourself. Do contact one of us (Tanya or John) or speak to a member of the MC if you would like more information.

The Board (also known as the Management Committee) is the governing body of the Chapel. As a registered charity and a Company Limited by Guarantee, we are governed by the rules of the Charities Commission and Companies House. The Committee is responsible for all the important decisions made, in consultation of course with the Minister, members and the congregation as appropriate. Recent members of the Chapel may not be aware that in Unitarianism all chapels are entirely self-sufficient and make their own decisions regarding the Minister, worship, finances and charitable and social activities. The main areas the MC is involved in include:

In the past two years, since Rev. Jim Robinson left, the Management Committee has been responsible, through the Worship Group and the Search Committee, for maintaining a high level of worship services and pastoral care and for finding and contracting with our new Minister,

Rev. Patrick O'Neill, and helping Patrick and Patricia settle in.

The MC oversees the management of the Chapel's property, which consists of the Chapel itself, the Hall, the Cottages and the car park. We are responsible for maintaining cordial and beneficial relationships with our external clients, the Academy School, the Rona Hart Dance Academy and the clients who pay to use the car park, and with those who rent the Chapel for rites of passage, concerts and other events. These collectively support the Chapel.

We support and encourage the Chapel's many social action initiatives.

We have a duty of care to maintain the buildings as can be seen by the recent work on the Hall, although this is an area that has been neglected somewhat in the past.

We are also involved in protecting the interests of individual members by helping to resolve disputes involving members, and of the Chapel as a whole if outside parties seek to engage with the Chapel in inappropriate ways.

The MC is guided by our Unitarian values and each meeting begins with a 'devotional' led by the Minister. The work of the Management Committee is a key part of the life of the Chapel. Being on the committee gives one a fascinating opportunity to see a wide spectrum of the Chapel's activities and to strive to influence it for the common good.

Rosslyn Hill Chapel would not exist without the committed support of a number of people who keep the various committees and working groups functioning harmoniously in a financially secure and safe environment. At the AGM, several people will be standing down from the MC as they come to the end of a term of service or have resigned, and there may be changes in leadership of other groups. This is an opportunity to review the past and look ahead, so in the run-up to the AGM, I would like to ask each of you to consider if there any additional ways in which you might help the Chapel.

A starting point might be to consider the following question:

"What do I get from the chapel in terms of spiritual nourishment,

social contact and sheer enjoyment compared with what I contribute in terms of help where it is needed or cash to keep everything running?"

First, the Chapel needs more volunteers both to replace some who may be stepping down, but also to take on additional roles as the Chapel grows. All help is welcome: as many people are busy, many are needed to take a share, however small, of the responsibilities. Volunteering is a special kind of activity. In this context it is useful to view the work you may do for the Chapel as an extension of your spiritual life, working not for money or ambition but working with others to help create something good.

Second, we need to pay our own way. The congregation has never in the past decades paid more than about 50% of the cost of providing the Minister, the worship space and the other facilities that are required to operate as a place of worship. It costs, for example, £40 a year for us to register each member with the General Assembly. We need to think hard about giving, so we build to a point where we can increase our commitment to and provide support for significant social action

programmes. To achieve this, the average contribution per member would need to be in the region of £500 - £750, depending on how you define it. We could then use any excess from rentals to help other people and projects.

At Rosslyn Hill Chapel we are proud of our long history as a Unitarian place of worship since 1692. To carry on this work, we cannot stand still. In Patrick, our settled minister, the Chapel has an inspiring leader. We hope you will think about how you can support the Chapel in 2012. Please get in touch if you have any comments or proposals or would like to know more about the work of the Management Committee. We would love to hear from you.

Several people commented on the privilege it was to be so close to such talent on such an informal and intimate occasion.

Tea and delicious home-made cakes were, according to one of the guests, "offered with such care" by the Social Action Committee, contributing to the friendly atmosphere.

The charity's Founder and Chief Executive, James Partridge, was present at the concert and spoke about optimism and

resilience during morning service the same day. As a result of a retiring collection at the end of the service, and the fundraising from the concert itself, a wonderful £820 was raised. This will support an expansion of Changing Faces' teams around the country, teams who change lives and change minds. They offer unique, specialist practical and emotional support to individuals with disfiguring conditions and education for professionals. They also campaign for 'face equality' - a world where people with disfigurements are treated fairly and enjoy equal rights and opportunities throughout their lives.
