From our Minister
Rev Patrick T. O'Neill

According to an old Hassidic teaching, every garment should have two pockets, with a separate message in each. In one pocket should be the reminder: "We are but dust and ashes." In the other should be found, "For us the universe was made."

We are but dust and ashes, and for us the Universe was made. Within this paradox of human perception lie the seeds of a thousand critiques and a million arguments. Sometimes theology amounts to little more than our convoluted attempt to reconcile in some understandable way these two awesome realisations of the human spirit.

A one-pocket theology will not suffice. An honest theology must account for the fullness of human experience. It must admit to our most terrible knowledge even as it proclaims our most soaring aspirations. Theology's task is to articulate the existential paradox in full acceptance of all our pain and all our glory.

We are but dust and ash, it cannot be denied. But clearly we are more. For we are also music and mathematics and dreams. This dust and ash speaks and cries and laughs and prays. This dust and ash clings to justice and to love. It feels anger and serenity and passion and regret. It knows sorrow and loss, it salutes compassion and courage, and it loves logic and symmetry.

We die eventually. And we weep in that terrible knowledge. Yet, while life pulses and the molecules still dance and tumble within us, this dust and ash shouts back at the stars that gave us birth. Even as it crumbles, it shouts a final and outrageous claim of faith: For us, this universe, for us! For me, yes! And also for you!

Feedback from the 2012 GA Meetings in Keele



The General Assembly of British Unitarians met at Keele University this year. Judy Harris and Erich Wagner were the delegates for Rosslyn Hill Chapel, with Kate Buchanan also attending but wearing her London District Association hat. Rosslyn Hill Chapel made contributions to the debates and succeeded in amending a motion calling for non-military national service to be non-compulsory. An emergency motion deploring the government proposal that security services and other agencies of the state may access private correspondence (including internet data, emails and text messages) without a warrant was passed overwhelmingly. This is something we can all do something about: everyone is strongly urged to write to their MP objecting to the government plan. The invited guest speaker this year was Paul Parker, recording clerk (aka chief executive) of the Quakers. Quakers are our close cousins in liberal dissenting religion and many of the challenges and opportunities he discussed are familiar to Unitarians.

Judy Harris and Erich Wagner will be conducting the service on Sunday 20 May and reporting back on the General Assembly in more detail then.

Erich will also be talking about his family's Easter holiday in Unitarian Transylvania and visit with a Minister.

The Board met on Thursday 19 April, Jane Crispin in the chair.

150th Anniversary: In 1862 the first service was held in the newly built chapel on Rosslyn Hill. Members are planning celebrations (all ideas and offers of help welcome). The Chapel is taking part in the Hampstead Summer Festival, 18-24 June (details on p.....)

Fundraising: It is hoped that the 150th will provide some fund raising opportunities. Major improvements to the Hall are being discussed and the Chapel roof may need attention. The Fund Raising Group has met. Anyone who would like to be involved, please contact Stella Fakiyesi.

Property Sale Group: Paul ver Bruggen reported that following the exchange of contracts on the sale of the Willoughby Road site, discussions were taking place in relation to the right to light issue.

Ministry Reports: Rev O'Neill had circulated his report. As well as taking morning and evening services on Sundays and attending meetings he had officiated at two weddings, a funeral and a baby naming. Much work has been done on the Children's programme, in consultation with Rev Emily Leite and Charlotte Illingworth. A Children's Programme Committee has now been formed.

The Membership Group meet at the end of April.

Worship Group: Gordon Jackson (leader) had circulated the Worship Calendar to Board members. He had asked them to assist the WG by acting as Worship Assistants. The Board suggested Elders also be asked to help.

Administrators' Report: Sharron Conduit had circulated her report. An intercom has now been fitted on the door in Pilgrim's Passage. This connects to the Vestry and the Academy school offices. The lock on the main gates is to be repaired and the gates will be locked at 10pm except when there is an event at the Chapel. A surveyor will inspect the Chapel roof and report.

The generous legacy from Mrs Helen Brandon Jones (£500) has gone towards the replacing of the Hall roof. A charitable donation has been received from the estate of Joan Mary Clayton. Sharron has written to express the Chapel's gratitude.

New members: Rev Rob Gregson, Kamala Hajiyeva, and the family Thomson (Steve and Robin, Elizabeth and Madeleine) wished to become members of the Chapel. The Board approved the applications and welcomed the new members.

Chair's report: Co-Chair James Chiriyankandath had

circulated a report and sent his apologies for absence. In response to a request by the MC, he had put together a list of leaders and committee members of all Chapel activities' groups. To assist good communications, groups would report through an MC member to the Board two or three times a year. This has not been finalized.

The MC are reviewing the staffing needs of the Chapel, and James had reported on current arrangements. A Staff committee is to be set up.

Treasurer's Report: Jane Crispin, Treasurer reported that the financial position is stable and that April is a month of increased revenues. She emphasised that the fundraising drive for a hall renovation is a very high financial priority

Finance Group: Jane reported that the Finance Group, formed following the SGM in February, has met. It is exploring how the Chapel can minimize costs and maximise revenues. The plan is for members to be given a clear picture of the way the Chapel is financed. The FG plans to report to members at an SGM in September so a full discussion of Chapel finances can take place. Group members: John Lawrence (leader), Stuart Bowman, Camino Euren, Roger Harrabin, Andrew Jurczynski

Commemorative Stones: The MC studied a plan which showed how the present 54 memorial stones could be relaid so as to make space for a further 33 spaces. The existing stones would be cleaned, and the edge of the plot marked with perhaps a low chain. Further discussion has to take place about a possible charge and other matters. Any recommendations will be put to Chapel members. However, as the area may be affected by work on the roof, no action is to be taken at present.

Where I Stand

In spite of having parents who were devoted Baptists and going to a strict Anglican Prep school, the only religious principle that I retained from my youth was that of the 'Inner Light' with which I had been imbued at my Quaker school.

In succeeding years, I did not give much thought to religion but any belief I had had in a benevolent personal God was abolished by all the suffering I saw as a doctor and by a letter I received from a vicar's wife telling me that my young wife's death was 'God's will'. Was this the ever-merciful God I had been brought up to believe in who could leave children aged 1 and 3 without a mother? I became an agnostic.

However, I eventually became aware that a significant aspect of my life had been neglected. I would call this my 'spiritual' life' if I knew exactly what 'spiritual' meant.

But I do have a strong belief in the importance of the human spirit. I realised that my Inner Light needed re-energising by joining a like-minded community and that it would burn brighter with the help of periods of quiet thoughtfulness and music.

Improving Unitarian Visibility

Melanie Haberstroh, member of the RHUC communications team, travelled to Great Hucklow to take part in the annual UCCN (Unitarian Communication Coordinators Network) conference. Led by the motto "Improving Unitarian visibility", communicators from Unitarian congregations around the country gathered for a series of seminars and workshops on improving the visibility of their congregations in the local community. Here is a summary of some of the conference highlights:

A workshop on how to make congregational websites more user-friendly and impactful put participants into the shoes of members of the general public who may never have heard of Unitarians before. In order to understand what it would be like to visit a Unitarian website for the first time, the workshop attendees looked at websites of various Mennonite churches in the United States. As most of the participants had never heard of the Mennonites, examining their websites quickly made it apparent what information would be most important to highlight on a Unitarian website that aims to attract new members of the public.

Another excellent presentation was given on Bury St. Edmunds' 300th Anniversary celebrations. These were a textbook example of how a small congregation can maximise their publicity from such an occasion – if it plans ahead! Bury St Edmunds put together a rich programme of events spanning the entire year. The "jewel in the crown" was a play that presented the story of the church building as well as the political and social background of the dissenter movement in Suffolk, which was made possible by a partnership with the Theatre Royal and a Heritage Lottery Fund grant. The play was written and performed with the help of talented young people from local schools and, along with an exhibition, toured to other theatres in the region.

The workshops once more highlighted that effective communication requires a sound strategy and careful planning, but that much can be achieved when Unitarians work together!
