News from the Management Committee

Meeting held on Thursday 14 June 2012

Minister's Report: Rev O'Neill reported on a busy month of services and meetings. He had had the pleasure of officiating at the wedding of Haley Glennie-Smith and Nick Holywell-Walker. He had attended a Ministers' Study Group in Boston, USA. He has taken part in this annual study group for a number of years. The Minister had made a number of pastoral visits. Rev Rob Gregson conducted the funeral service for Wendy Collins.

Simple Gifts: Rev O'Neill, and his wife, Patricia, and a number of Chapel members had attended the successful launch of the Simple Gifts outreach programme in Bethnal Green of which Rev Rob Gregson is the Director. Patrick is on the Board of this project.

He noted with sadness the death of Wendy Collins. He and Patricia, and some other Chapel members had attended Wendy's funeral.

Rev Emily Manvel Leite: The Minister thanked Emily for her generous volunteer help with the Children's programme. Emily and her family would shortly return to the States, after a year in London. All present expressed their thanks.

In his report Rev O'Neill noting how many Chapel activities members are involved with, wrote 'Let us never fail to be grateful and appreciative of people's contributions!'

Worship Group: Gordon Jackson's report had been circulated. The MC agreed that the WG should have its own budget so it could draw on this for payment of visiting Worship Leaders and their expenses.

The WG have Worship Leaders in place for all ministerial absences to the end of the year. Gordon thanked the members of the MC and Elders who had offered to be the Worship Assistants.

Property Sale Group: Paul ver Bruggen reported that negotiations regarding the right to light issue were continuing.

150th Anniversary: A number of events had been arranged, starting with a Midsummer Celebration on 21 June and an Open Chapel event on 24 June. Space had been let to a trader selling home made ice cream, and it was hoped the Children's Chapel would put on an activity for young people. Christopher Mason is contacting UUA ministers to tell any of them or members of their churches who are visiting the UK for the Olympics, about the Chapel.

Fund Raising: Stella Fakiyesi's report had been circulated. A two stage programme of work on the Hall was being drawn up, each stage with a clear budget and goals. The refurbished Hall space will increase the Chapel's income as it will be available for events in the holidays and at weekends. Fund raising needs good publicity, and the Comms Team have been given a budget to employ a graphic designer to remodel the website. Stella and Jane Crispin are the fund raising team at the moment. More help from members is needed with this major project. (If you would like to be involved, please contact Stella at stellafakiyesi@hotmail.com)

Administrator's Report: Sharron Conduit had circulated her report. The new Notices board was useful, but it was felt a black background for the notices would look more in keeping. Sharron thanked Patricia Williams for her help with the Notice board. Mr Leaver (Huggy) is working as handyman, and assists the caretaker with heavy lifting.

General Assembly Sunday: The GA asks chapels/churches to make a collection for the work of the GA on Sunday 1 July. It was agreed a second collection envelope would be given out. Members would be informed in advance.

Piano: Work needs to be done on the Steinway. Quotes are being sought.

Membership: Katherine Florin, James Sefton and their children, Mia, Noah, Kezzie, Hope and Jem Florin-Sefton had applied for membership. The MC welcomed the news and approved the application.

Treasurer's Report: Jane Crispin had circulated her report. Cash flow was satisfactory this month. It is hoped that when memberships are renewed, members will pay by standing order. She spoke about the need to maximise revenue and reduce costs. The Long-Term Finance committee will set out to increase awareness of Chapel costs. Staffing costs are being looked at and responsibilities reviewed. The question of what jobs could be undertaken by volunteers was discussed. Help would be welcomed, but the need for volunteer help to be regular and reliable was emphasised.

Reports from Chapel Groups:

Social Action Committee: Stephanie Heyndericks reported that the SAC are pleased to be taking part in the Cold Weather Shelter project again this winter. A Book Fair is planned for November. Each month the tea and coffee money goes to a different charity, local or international. A discussion took place as to whether the Chapel should fund the purchase of tea etc

Flower Group: Patricia Williams had circulated a report. The Group provides the flower arrangements of fresh flowers for every Sunday in the year, with special displays for major festivals and events. Members have been asked to help with the cost by sponsoring a

Sunday's flowers, and a collection for Chapel flowers is made on two or three Sundays a year. More helpers are sought on the rota arranged by Helene Howard.

Elders: Tanya Morrison (chair) reported that the Elders had met with Rev O'Neill and had a full discussion. The Elders' role in conflict resolution was being taken forward.

Co-Chairs report: this had been circulated.

Rev O' Neill confirmed as settled minister: James Chiriyankandath noted that Rev O'Neill's period of probation as settled minister had been completed. The MC wished to record its satisfaction at the way he had settled into his role at Rosslyn Hill and Rev O'Neill said how positive he was feeling, and pleased to be the Chapel's minister.

Organist: The MC welcomed the news that the contract with Sholto Kynoch had been signed and Sholto was now the Chapel's organist.

Chapel silver: Patricia Williams has written a short history of the Chapel's various pieces of silver, illustrated with beautiful photographs. A copy can be seen in the Administrator's office. The MC thanked Patricia for this useful and attractive contribution to the Chapel's records.

Follow-up on GA Resolutions

As readers will know from TV, Radio and press the Church of England continues to tie itself in knots over same-sex marriage. Unitarians can take pride in being in the fore-front of debate on this issue. At the General Assembly a resolution was overwhelmingly passed in favour of campaigning for equal access to all forms of marriage (this means religious ceremonies as well as civil partnerships). The very first church to perform a same-sex civil partnership on religious premises was a Unitarian chapel just a few weeks ago. The next hurdle campaigners will face is to overcome the clumsy half-way house that is "civil partnership" and move to a form of "marriage" that does not discriminate.

Another resolution passed at the GA was to oppose the governments "snoopers' charter" where police and security forces would have access to records of everyone's email, text, and

web traffic without court order. Once again this is an issue very much in the news. Unitarians have a proud tradition of standing up for civil and religious liberty. The state should be concerned with protecting citizen's privacy rather than interfering disproportionately in our lives.

Coming up at the next GA will be our stance on assisted dying - another controversial issue with tremendous weight. Each one of us will have an opinion and we can all contribute. We can talk about this in our own groups but there is also a Unitarian life beyond the walls of this chapel and I recommend *The Inquirer*, *The Unitarian* and *LDPA Pulse* as worthwhile regular reading matter. There are also many great Unitarian Facebook groups, UK Unitarians is very active but two interesting recent additions are *Humanist Unitarians* and *Religion for Atheists*.
